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SELECTED CHRONOLOGY

1891

Born 21 October in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, the only child of Gertrude H. Dorwart Cone (1859-1918) and Harry DeForest Cone (1860-1931).

Graduated Adams Elementary School, Cedar Rapids. Enrolled in Washington High School. Grant Wood (1891-1942) a fellow classmate and close friend. Active contributor to the high school literary magazine.

1910

Graduated Washington High School, Cedar Rapids. Enrolled in Coe College, Cedar Rapids. Class curriculum emphasized English, economics, French, history, and the sciences, with no studio work and only a few courses in classical art history.

1913

Visited the Armory Show during its Chicago exhibition at the Art Institute (24 March-15 April). Active contributor to the Cor College Cosmos.

1914

Graduated magna cum laude from Coe College, receiving bachelor of science degree. Moved to Chicago in the fall and entered the School of the Art Institute of Chicago. Studied under Atelier and Concours System with Antonin Sterba (1875-1963), Karl A. Buehr (1866-1952), Louis W. Wilson (1872-1919), Elmer A. Forsberg (1876-1934), and Ralph F. Seymour (1874-1966).

1915

Excelled in drawing and decorative illustration, creating some of his earliest gouache works of cloud banks. Began contributing illustrations to *The Continent*, a magazine published in New York, Philadelphia, and Chicago in affiliation with the Presbyterian Church. Executed more than seventy-five designs through 1917. Arthur W. Hall (1889-1981) was his roommate and close friend.

1917

Exhibited paintings of clouds in St. Paul Institute's *Third Annual Exhibition of the Work of Northwestern Artists*, 3-14 March, St. Paul, Minnesota. Interrupted his studies at the Art Institute of Chicago, returned to Cedar Rapids in May, and enlisted in the U.S. Army, Headquarters Company of the 67th Brigade—34th Division. Trained at Camp Cody, Deming, New Mexico, and designed the Red Bull insignia. Conducted some excavations in the Mimbres Valley, unearthing bowl fragments and human skulls.

1918

Departed Camp Cody in August for France with Brigadier General Hubert Allen of Cedar Rapids. Cone acted as General Allen's interpreter and did not see combat.

1919

Studied for about five months at the Ecole des Beaux Arts, Montpellier, France. Returned to Cedar Rapids on 30 July. In the fall, began teaching French in the Department of Romance Languages at Coe College. Remained at Coe College for the next forty-one years, teaching French, studio art, the humanities, and art history. Established first studio class in freehand drawing in 1919 and continued teaching the subject until 1960. Exhibited thirty-one paintings at the Picture Galleries, the Killian Company, 9-22 October. Renewed involvement with the Cedar Rapids Art Association.

1920

Traveled to Europe with Grant Wood in the summer. Left Cedar

Rapids on 5 June, spent 6-8 June in Chicago, 10-12 June in Montreal, departed on 12 June. Arrived 22 June in Liverpool on transit to Paris. Returned 22 August from Antwerp to Cedar Rapids aboard SS Grampian; exhibited thirty paintings in the ship's salon and subsequently at the Cedar Rapids Art Association. Met Elizabeth Winnifred Swift on the voyage, introduced by Grant Wood. Became engaged 26 November. Winnifred born in Watford, Ontario, the child of English-Scottish and Irish parents, Elizabeth Dodds (1868-1964) and Edward Dimond Swift (1861-1934). Together with Grant Wood, Cone held two exhibitions, 14-28 April and 10-20 November, at the Cedar Rapids Public Library Art Gallery.

1921

Married Winnifred Swift 10 August at Trinity Church, Watford, Ontario.

1922

Exhibition in Cedar Rapids at the Public Library Art Gallery, 22-29 April. Daughter Doris Elaine born 21 November.

1923

Exhibition in Cedar Rapids at the Public Library Art Gallery, May. Moved to existing residence at 1721 5th Avenue S.E., Cedar Rapids.

1924

Attended graduate classes in French language and literature at the University of Iowa to satisfy new degree requirements for faculty at Coe College. Exhibition in Cedar Rapids at the Public Library Art Gallery, April.

1926

David Turner held a private sale of Cone paintings on 22 June. Began teaching advanced still-life painting at Coe College.

1927

Awarded diploma 17 June from the Department of Drawing, Painting, and Illustration of the School of the Art Institute of Chicago. Exhibition in Cedar Rapids with Grant Wood at Coe College, Williston Hall, November.

1928

The Little Gallery established as an experimental art station by the American Federation of Arts and the Carnegie Foundation. Edward B. Rowan (1898-1946) was director. Exhibition in Cedar Rapids at Coe College, Williston Hall, November.

1929

Financed by subscription of twenty community patrons, the Cones traveled to Paris with Rowan on 1 June. Established friendships with Paul Manship (1885-1966), Hermon McNeil (1866-1947), Louis Ritman (1889-1963), and Daniel Catton Rich (1904-76), among others. Returned in September. Exhibited results of Paris trip at the Little Gallery, with great success. Participated in the Iowa Artists' Club First Annual Exhibition of Paintings and Sculpture, November.

1930

During the 1930s, Cone participated in seventy-four exhibitions, including thirteen one-man shows. Exhibition in Cedar Rapids at Coe College, Williston Hall, March.

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Awarded Thompson Prize from the Iowa Artists' Club Annual Exhibition of Paintings and Sculpture for Studio Corner (cat. no. 247). Exhibition in Cedar Rapids at Coe College, April. Established relationship with the Chicago Galleries Association. Awarded first prize for still-life at the Iowa State Fair and Exposition for Mille Fleurs Tapestry (cat. no. 233).

Taught life drawing and landscape painting at the Stone City Colony and Art School, Stone City, Iowa, 26 June-6 August. Other participants included: Conger Metcalf (b. 1914), Grant Wood, Arnold Pyle (1908-73), Florence Sprague (1883-1955), David McCosh (1903-80), Adrian J. Dornbush (1900-unknown), and Edward B. Rowan. Participated in various group exhibitions. Courses accredited by Coe College. Began teaching art orientation at Coe College.

1933

Exhibitions in Cedar Rapids at the Little Gallery of the Cedar Rapids Art Association in May and at Coe College in June. Taught figure drawing at the Stone City Colony and Art School, 27 June-22 August.

Appointed professor of drawing and painting at Coe College in October. Served in that capacity until 1960. Also appointed instructor in French and chairman of the Faculty Committee on Dramatics. Exhibition at the Cedar Rapids Art Association, March. Spent the summers of 1934-36 with Paul and Mary (Nissen) Engle near the Green Mansion at Stone City, Iowa.

Awarded Sweepstakes Prize at the Iowa State Fair and Exposition for River Bend (cat. no. 308). Participated in various group exhibitions.

Participated in a group exhibition at Walker Galleries, New York. River Bend No. 3 (cat. no. 316) included in the 131st Annual Exhibition at the Pennsylvania Academy of the Fine Arts, Philadelphia, 26 January-1 March. Exhibitions at the Chicago Galleries Association, 18 March-8 April; Coe College, 26 April-10 May; and the Little Gallery of the Cedar Rapids Art Association, fall,

1936-64

1939

Spent five weeks painting in Taxco, Mexico. Exhibited results of sabbatical and Mexico trip at the Cedar Rapids Art Association, 15-31 October. Auction of exhibited works, 1 November, netted \$4,000. Continued teaching at Coe College and maintained Granby Building studio for about two years. Exhibitions at Iowa State University, Ames, 25 January-10 February; Cornell College, Mount Vernon, Iowa, 4-20 March; Coe College, June; University of Iowa, Iowa City, 10-23 July; and the Cedar Rapids Art Association, 15-31 October. Stone Fruit Sketch No. 1 (cat. no. 338) included in the Eighteenth International Exhibition of Watercolors, Pastels, Drawings, and Monotypes at the Art Institute of Chicago, 23 March-14 May.

1965


