The dramatic landscapes and rich cultures of the American Southwest fueled the imaginations of many early 20th-century artists, including Georgia O'Keeffe. Their evocative still-life paintings illuminate art's capacity to reveal the essence of a place and time. Eloquent Objects features 22 works by O'Keeffe and 42 by her contemporaries, sharing their impressions of the richness and diversity of New Mexico. It is the first major exhibition to focus on the role of still life as a means of exploring the region.

For painter Georgia O'Keeffe, whose iconic still lifes of sun-bleached bones and desert flowers are acknowledged masterworks of American art, the dramatic landscapes and mix of cultures in New Mexico proved an endless source of inspiration.
